John 11:17-27 NIV

17 On his arrival, Jesus found that Lazarus had already been in the tomb for four days. **18** Now Bethany was less than two miles[b] from Jerusalem, **19** and many Jews had come to Martha and Mary to comfort them in the loss of their brother. **20** When Martha heard that Jesus was coming, she went out to meet him, but Mary stayed at home.

21 "Lord," Martha said to Jesus, "if you had been here, my brother would not have died. **22** But I know that even now God will give you whatever you ask."

23 Jesus said to her, "Your brother will rise again."

24 Martha answered, "I know he will rise again in the resurrection at the last day."

25 Jesus said to her, "I am the resurrection and the life. The one who believes in me will live, even though they die; **26** and whoever lives by believing in me will never die. Do you believe this?"

27 "Yes, Lord," she replied, "I believe that you are the Messiah, the Son of God, who is to come into the world."



John 11:28-37 NIV

28 After she had said this, she went back and called her sister Mary aside. "The Teacher is here," she said, "and is asking for you." **29** When Mary heard this, she got up quickly and went to him. **30** Now Jesus had not yet entered the village, but was still at the place where Martha had met him. **31** When the Jews who had been with Mary in the house, comforting her, noticed how quickly she got up and went out, they followed her, supposing she was going to the tomb to mourn there.

32 When Mary reached the place where Jesus was and saw him, she fell at his feet and said, "Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died."

33 When Jesus saw her weeping, and the Jews who had come along with her also weeping, he was deeply moved in spirit and troubled. **34** "Where have you laid him?" he asked.

"Come and see, Lord," they replied.

<mark>35</mark> Jesus wept.

36 Then the Jews said, "See how he loved him!"

37 But some of them said, "Could not he who opened the eyes of the blind man have kept this man from dying?"



1. When grieving the possible death of their brother, the sisters called on the one who had the power to change the situation

JESUS

- 2. When grieving we must understand that God's timing is not our timing and His ways are not our ways
 - v6. He stayed where he was two more days,
 - v17. On his arrival, Jesus found that Lazarus had already been in the tomb for four days
 - v18 Now Bethany was less than two miles[b] from Jerusalem

GOD is not confined by time nor distance



- 1. When grieving God reaches us in our individuality and meets us where we are.
 - For Martha, Jesus responded with biblical truth and reminded her that she was looking at the resurrection. She didn't need to wait for it to see her brother again.
 - For Mary, Jesus felt the pain of her loss and was troubled too, so He came alongside His friend and grieved with her.

Your Grief Process is Unique

- 2. When grieving people or circumstances we must believe that God is well able to heal, deliver, and make alive again.
 - It's God's prerogative whether he brings back to life or not, but we must know that He is always able.

2 Samuel 12:9-14 NIV

9 Why did you despise the word of the LORD by doing what is evil in his eyes? You struck down Uriah the Hittite with the sword and took his wife to be your own. You killed him with the sword of the Ammonites. **10** Now, therefore, the sword will never depart from your house, because you despised me and took the wife of Uriah the Hittite to be your own.'

11 "This is what the LORD says: 'Out of your own household I am going to bring calamity on you. Before your very eyes I will take your wives and give them to one who is close to you, and he will sleep with your wives in broad daylight. **12** You did it in secret, but I will do this thing in broad daylight before all Israel."

13 Then David said to Nathan, "I have sinned against the LORD."

Nathan replied, "The Lord has taken away your sin. You are not going to die. **14** But because by doing this you have shown utter contempt for[a] the Lord, the son born to you will die."



2 Samuel 12:15-20 NIV

15 After Nathan had gone home, the LORD struck the child that Uriah's wife had borne to David, and he became ill. **16** David pleaded with God for the child. He fasted and spent the nights lying in sackcloth[b] on the ground. **17** The elders of his household stood beside him to get him up from the ground, but he refused, and he would not eat any food with them.

18 On the seventh day the child died. David's attendants were afraid to tell him that the child was dead, for they thought, "While the child was still living, he wouldn't listen to us when we spoke to him. How can we now tell him the child is dead? He may do something desperate."

19 David noticed that his attendants were whispering among themselves, and he realized the child was dead. "Is the child dead?" he asked.

"Yes," they replied, "he is dead."

20 Then David got up from the ground. After he had washed, put on lotions and changed his clothes, he went into the house of the LORD and worshiped. Then he went to his own house, and at his request they served him food, and he ate.



2 Samuel 12:21-24 NIV

- **21** His attendants asked him, <mark>"Why are you acting this way? While the child was alive, you fasted and wept, but now that the child is dead, you get up and eat!"</mark>
- **22** He answered, "While the child was still alive, I fasted and wept. I thought, 'Who knows? The Lord may be gracious to me and let the child live.' **23** But now that he is dead, why should I go on fasting? Can I bring him back again? I will go to him, but he will not return to me."
- **24** Then David comforted his wife Bathsheba, and he went to her and made love to her. She gave birth to a son, and they named him Solomon. The Lord loved him; **25** and because the Lord loved him, he sent word through Nathan the prophet to name him Jedidiah.[c]



- 1. God is ultimately in control, but we have free will and choice.
- 2. We live in a fallen world due to sin and therefore there are trials and tribulation that we must face in this life.

God Allows Hardship in This Life

3. Sometimes we can bring grief upon ourselves because of our own choices, behaviours, and disobedience to God or cause grief for others.

Choices Can Bring About Grief



- 1. How did David respond when stricken with severe grief at the illness and death diagnosis of his son with Bathsheba?
 - David pleaded with God for the child.
 - He fasted and spent the nights lying in sackcloth on the ground.
 - The elders of his household stood beside him to get him up from the ground, but he refused.
 - He would not eat any food with them.

Grief Can Bring on a Cycle of Emotions

- 2. How did David and others respond once his son died?
 - His support system was scared to tell him because he was already severely mourning
 - David got up from the ground, washed, put on lotions and changed his clothes.
 - He went into the house of the LORD and worshiped.
 - Then he went to his own house, and at his request they served him food, and he ate.



- 1. Even at the death of a person or thing, we must keep the faith that all will be made well in eternity for those who believe
 - v23 But now that he is dead, why should I go on fasting? Can I bring him back again? I will go to him, but he will not return to me."
 - David turned his thinking from this life to his eternal life.

To Live is Christ, and To Die is Gain

- 2. When life happens and all seems lost, we must know that God can restore our souls.
 - v24 Then David comforted his wife Bathsheba, and he went to her and made love to her. She gave birth to a son, and they named him Solomon. The LORD loved him;
 - Solomon went on to become one of the greatest and wisest Kings.
 - Many of David's other son's from his polygamous relationships and behaviours brought about negative family dynamics yet God still used David.


TELANTIC MEN

- 7. Accept there is no blueprint in the natural for this process.




THE GRIEF WHEEL

- 3. Renew your mind by seeking God daily, hourly, by minute.
- 4. Surround yourself with a support system.
- 5. Pray, Pray, & Pray without ceasing.
- 6. Seek grief counseling.
- 7. Do not avoid the vulnerable place of grief.
- 8. Feel all of the feels, Jesus did and He could raise people from the dead.
- 9. Don't compare your progress to someone else.
- 10. Live, laugh, and love.
